1. The context of this prayer and liturgy policy

‘The celebration of Catholic liturgies and prayers as an integral part of the learning and teaching should enable the school community to become reflective, experience the presence of God and should develop a mature spiritual life.’ (Marcus Stock (2012), *Christ at the Centre*, Catholic Truth Society, 23.)

2. Statement of requirement

The law requires all maintained Catholic schools to provide an act of daily collective worship (prayer and liturgy) for all pupils, including those in the sixth form (Section 70, 1988 Education Act) that is in accordance with the rites, practices, disciplines, and liturgical norms of the Catholic Church (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, schedule 20; Instrument of Government, clause 2). Academies in England are required by their funding agreement and Articles of Association to comply with similar requirements (*The Mainstream Academy and Free School: Supplemental Funding Agreement*, December 2020; *Model Articles for Catholic Academies*, February 2019).

The law requires all maintained schools to recognise and respect that parents have the legal right to withdraw their children up to the age of 16 from prayer and liturgy (School Standards and Framework Act 1998, s.71(1A)).

Prayer and liturgy are not designated curriculum time. In the context of the Catholic school, this means that times of prayer and liturgy are not considered to be part of the allocation of curriculum time for Religious Education.

3. Responsibility

(a) Governance

The governors, as guardians of the Catholic school’s life and mission, have a responsibility to ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- the Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator is responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school
- the prayer and liturgy policy is updated regularly and shared with all stakeholders
- there is a budget for prayer and liturgy that reflects its centrality to the life of a Catholic school.

(b) Headteacher

The Headteacher, as the spiritual leader of the school as a Catholic community, ensures that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line

with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*

- they work in partnership with the leader(s) for prayer and liturgy
- those responsible for prayer and liturgy in the school have been given appropriate training and formation to ensure that all guidance is followed and adhered to
- there are suitable resources for prayer and liturgy in the school.

(c) Prayer and Liturgy Coordinator

Those responsible for prayer and liturgy ensure that:

- prayer and liturgy are central to the Catholic life of the school and therefore are in line with the guidance set out by the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- there is an Annual Plan of Provision for prayer and liturgy across the school year which identifies liturgical seasons and key celebrations, as well as opportunities for the celebration of the Sacraments
- there is daily planned prayer for all pupils, appropriate to age and ability, as outlined in the *Prayer and Liturgy Directory*
- pupils are supported in their liturgical formation to take an active role in the planning, preparation, and delivery of prayer and liturgy according to their age and capacity, and in a manner which facilitates their progressive participation
- resources to support the planning of prayer and liturgy are appropriate and readily available to staff and pupils
- induction on prayer and liturgy takes place for new members of staff as required
- staff have access to effective training and formation opportunities
- monitoring and evaluation of prayer and liturgy take place regularly and feed back into planning for future liturgies
- monitoring of prayer and liturgy is reported to the Headteacher and governing body to support whole-school development and the Catholic life of the school
- there is collaboration with local clergy and parishes
- liaison with the Diocesan Education Service and others is maintained to ensure they keep updated with best practice.

4. Overview of prayer and liturgy provision

Masses

- Mass is an important part of the school timetabling. We understand that, for many Catholics, access to church may be limited and therefore want to model to the children the importance of attending church. Children attend the masses as timetabled in the APOP, with children taking part as appropriate.

Daily Assembly

- Mondays – Celebration of the word – This uses the messages from the Sunday Gospel and shares this with the children, responding to the word of God and listening to the meaning of the stories and readings. It includes gathering, worship in song, Prayers of the Faithful, outreach about how we can support people around the world (linked to

Catholic Social Teaching - CST) and using the school Mission Statement. We gather together in the school hall, at the heart of the community.

- Tuesday / Thursdays – Key Stage Assemblies and class assemblies – Looking at Key themes in the church calendar
- Wednesday – Worship through singing and sharing the stories of the Bible through song
- Friday – Celebration Assembly – Recognising the achievements of the children through the work of the Holy Spirit

5. Our school context

The Headteacher, oversees all religious instruction in the school and uses staff to ensure the policies in place are adhered to.

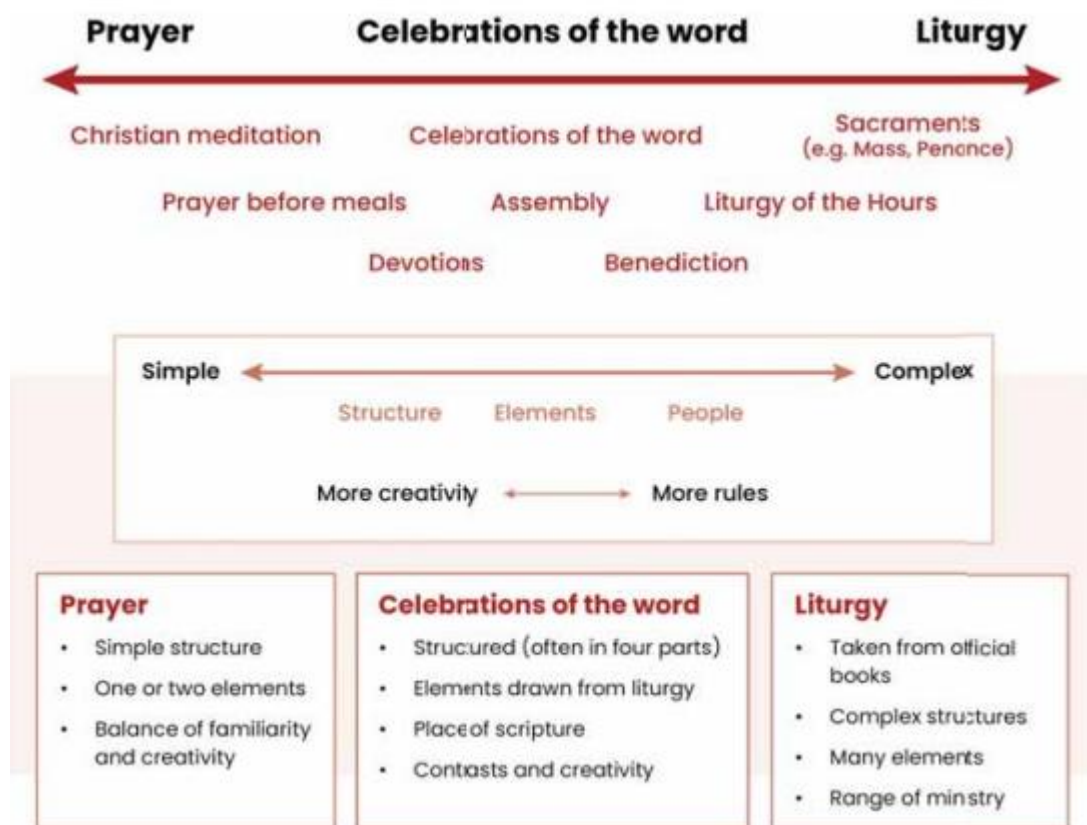
The R.E. Co-Ordinators must be Catholic and ensures the R.E. curriculum is delivered in the school. They lead on school based CPD and liaise with the diocese for other support in relation to the curriculum.

The Prayer and Liturgy Leader, leads on the delivery of Prayer and Liturgy.

Catholic Schools have a particular mission to reveal to the children in their care, who Jesus is and to teach them how to know Him (Knowledge), love Him (Discern) and follow him (Respond). As with all relationships, knowing and loving someone depends on spending time with them, speaking to them and listening to what they have to say. This is what is meant in participation in prayer.

Everyone in our school community is invited to participate in every aspect on prayer and liturgy. This participation begins with presence in the celebration and may progress to more active roles through engaging the senses or reflecting on the content in relation to their own experiences.

All baptised Christians are baptised priest, prophet and king; all who need to be ministered to at different times and as part of their journey, some may be called to minister to others. Pupils and staff who respond to the invitation to serve the community in this way will first be formed for their ministry so that they can enable others to meet Jesus from their own starting points.



Our school offers a rich diet of prayer and liturgical experiences for all of the children, on a continuum from least complex from simple prayer to the more complex including full participation in the Mass.

Prayer

- Everyone is invited to take part in communal prayer, for example in the classes at the beginning and end of the day or in meetings. Prayer can either be led by staff or children, with appropriate formation. Children of other faiths are invited to participate respectfully as far as their own faith permits them. All children are expected to maintain a respectful presence at times of prayer.

Celebration of the Word Assemblies

- When proclaiming the Gospel we say, "Glory to you O Lord" and end it with "Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ"
- Scripture in assembly will be proclaimed by Lectors who have been formed in the ministry of proclaiming the Word of God.

Mass

- The whole school community are invited to join with us at Holy Mass at The Sacred Heart of Our Lady. Our intention is to include everyone in prayerful silence, joyful sung

praise and in listening to the word of God. We seek to make our actions prayerful and deliberate so that they can be recognised by the youngest children in our school community. All members of the community are invited to receive a blessing from the priest.

- During Mass, scripture will be proclaimed by Lectors who have been formed in the ministry of proclaiming the Word of God. Mass readings will be taken from Universalis where possible and where appropriate; otherwise readings for the theme of the Mass will be drawn from the children's R.E. learning (in accordance with the RE Directory) and where appropriate to the liturgical calendar.
- Alter servers will be drawn from those who have been formed in this ministry in their local parishes.
- Children who have made their First Holy Communion will be called to present the gifts of the Bread and the Wine for consecration on behalf of the congregation.
- Classes who have been linked to the Mass preparation will share symbols linked to the liturgy, year group or the school. They will be invited to participate through singing, Mass responses and through silent reflection.
- At Holy Communion, all members of the community are invited to receive a blessing from the priest. Children in YR to YR1-4 will receive a group blessing. Children in classes where the First Holy Communion has taken place and did not make this themselves are invited to come up for an individual blessing. They present themselves with arms crossed over their chest.
- Children who are receiving Holy Communion will be supported by class teachers to process up and receive, respond with 'Amen' and cross themselves.

Other Liturgies (E.G. Crowning of Our Lady; Adoration)

- Ministries in other liturgies will be carried out by children who have made their First Holy Communion (or baptised Catholic) and have been formed in their roles.

Sacrament of Reconciliation

- All children are invited to receive a blessing from the presiding priest, whether or not they have been prepared to receive the sacrament. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is available to all children who have received their first reconciliation after a period of preparation by the parish.

Music

"Music is an integral to liturgy and celebrations of the word... Music highlights or gives prominence to the part of the liturgy where it is used. Therefore music matches the high points of the liturgy". (PLD 6.2)

- All children are invited to fully participate in leading music during Mass; either through playing instruments, leading actions or singing.

- Music should be chosen to ensure that the text and the music fit the context of the liturgy and offer variety to develop a rich musical repertoire.
- Priority is given to singing the liturgical texts at Mass which include the Gospel Acclamation and the Mass Setting.
- All music and hymns should reflect the Catholic teaching and understanding of faith.
- Secular music where the text is consistent with Catholic teaching may be used in some forms of prayer assemblies.

6. Resourcing

Prayer and liturgy are central to the school's understanding of itself as a Catholic school, and this is reflected in the annual budget allocation and available resources, including staff time, chaplaincy provision, and dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy. The Catholic character of the school is reflected in religious artefacts and images on display throughout the building. Dedicated spaces for prayer and liturgy will be furnished and maintained as such, and updated to reflect the Church's liturgical season. Staff training and formation costs will be funded separately to ensure that all staff are able to fulfil their responsibility to contribute to the prayer and liturgical life of the school.

7. Training and formation

All new staff will be supported during induction and beyond, so that they fully understand the responsibility they carry within their individual role for leading prayer and liturgy in the school. Any individual training needs will be identified and addressed through training and formation. There will also be the opportunity for whole-staff professional development at least once a year, so that all staff understand the importance of prayer and liturgy and relevant staff are well supported to lead as required.

8. Monitoring and evaluation

Monitoring and evaluation of the quality and impact of prayer and liturgy will take place regularly, and at least annually, and involve all key stakeholders: pupils, parents, staff, clergy, and governors. Areas for development will be identified and issues raised will be actioned and evidenced as appropriate.

9. Review

The policy will be reviewed as part of the regular cycle of policy review conducted by the governors.

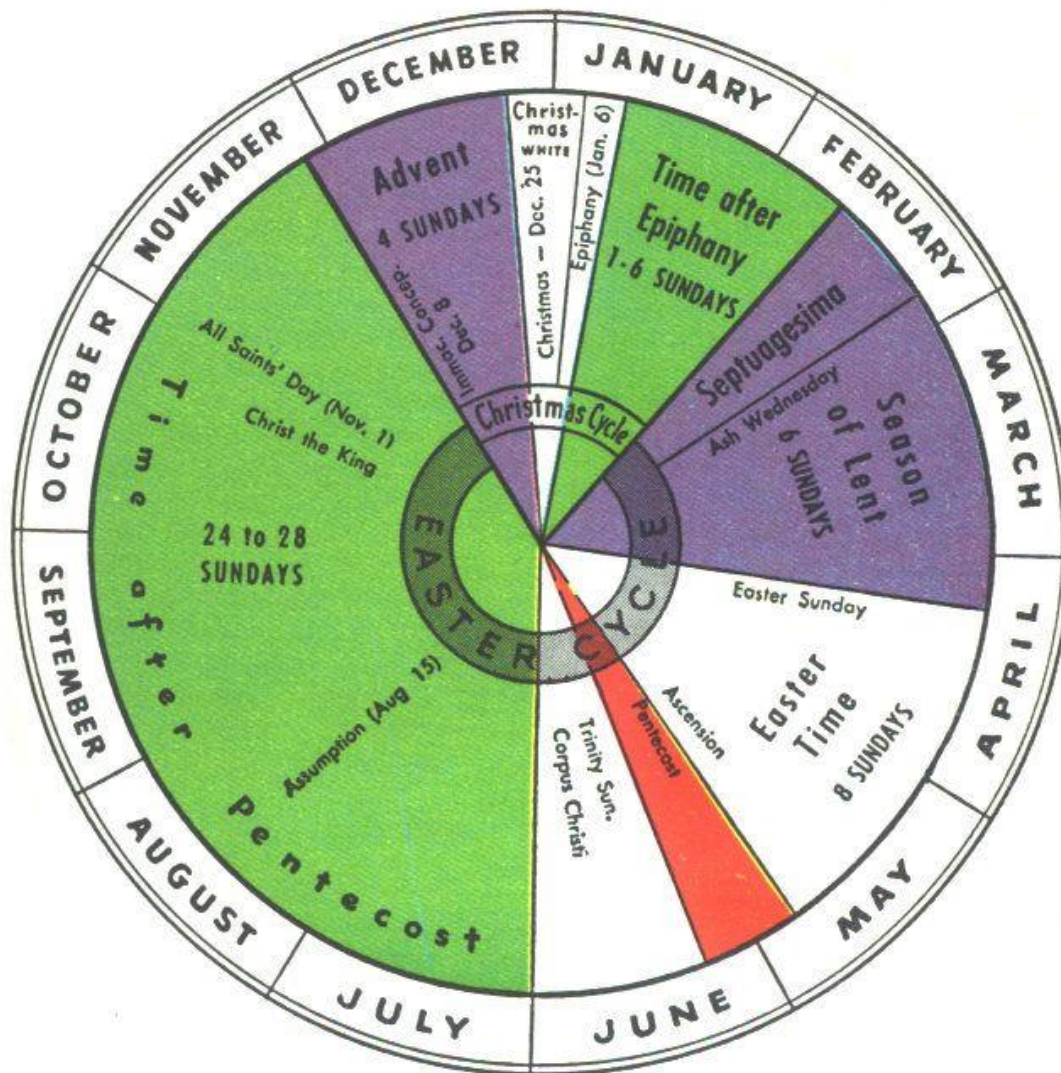
