May is the Month of Mary


In his Gospel, Luke tells us that Mary said, "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Then the angel departed from her (Luke 1:38).

In May, we remember Mary. All Gabriel needed was Mary's answer. Knowing that God had chosen her, because of her faith she knew that she would be able to do what He asked of her. We look up to Mary because through all our questions and doubts, we are reminded to have faith and to rest assured that God will always look after us.



This period at home might be the perfect time to come together and to pray the **rosary**, or part of it (perhaps a decade) each week. <u>www.teachingcatholickids.com</u> explains clearly what the mysteries are for each decade, and also explains the order of the prayers used when praying the rosary.

Lectio Divina and "Year of the Word"



Lectio Divina is a time of quiet listening and prayer, when we allow ourselves to listen to God speaking to <u>us</u>. Both pupils and staff have enjoyed taking part in this over the last few years.

We sit in a group, light a candle and one person reads a short text for the first time. People may wish to share the word or phrase that has come to them. The text can be read aloud once more, before people reflect upon it, and they may want to share their thoughts and perhaps apply it to their

own lives to understand God's message to them. The session ends with a prayer and the Sign of the Cross.

We have been asked to focus on the <u>Gospel of Matthew</u> this year, and it is perfect for *Lectio Divina*. I do hope you will try it with your family; it is a very peaceful 20 minutes, or so. Every week, I shall suggest a piece of scripture you could focus on, but do feel free to use ANY verses you may wish; I have chosen <u>Matthew 5:13-16</u>.

This Sunday is "Good Shepherd Sunday" and the Gospel reading is from John 10:1-10. As the current RE topic on <u>Pentecost</u> draws to an end, several "big" questions could be focused upon to show a deeper understanding of what's been learnt. These could be used as a discussion point as they do encourage us to think about why we are learning this topic:

Year 4: What's so important about new life?	Year 5: How can energy transform?
Year 6: What do I want to witness to in my life?
