#### World Refugee Day: Saturday 20th June 2020



At St Francis', at this time of the year, we remember the many people who have had to flee from their homes and often from their families in order to stay safe. It is very often an incredibly frightening time for them, and our aim, as Pope Francis has asked us to do, is to ensure that our pupils understand and reflect on the hardships faced by refugees so that they may empathise with them and imagine a kinder world

which is full of empathy, understanding and mutual respect.
