Value of the month - Appreciation

Dear Pupils and Parents,
Over the past few months, I have suggested many different activities that you could be doing together at home, activities that help nurture the spiritual part of our beings. I would love to hear from you how you have managed to do Lectio Divina at home, or if you have been able to share the assemblies as a family. Has this led to good discussions of the Gospel at home?
It would also be wonderful if you could send some of the creative work you have done for $R E$, or your spiritual journaling, into school so that I could share it in future newsletters.
This week we remember two very important, and very different men - St Peter and St Paul - as it is their Feast Day on Monday 29th June.

## St Peter and St Paul

"You are Peter and on this rock, I will build my church"(Matthew 16:13-19)


St Peter and St Paul were very different, but both were very important in sharing the good news of Jesus.
Peter, also known as Simon Peter, was the first leader of the early Church. Originally a fisherman, Peter led the church until he died in about 64 AD. He was crucified under Emperor Nero and is buried in St Peter's Basilica in Rome. In Art, Peter is often shown holding the keys to the kingdom of heaven.
It is believed that Paul was a descendent of Benjamin's, brother to Joseph. He was from a devout Jewish family. He persecuted many Christians prior to his conversion on his way to Damascus (which you study in yr4); at the time, he was known as Saul of Tarsus. He was well-educated and spread the Gospel far and wide, including in places like Corinth, Ephesia and Galatia where he founded several Christian communities. We read about some of his teachings in his letters to the Corinthians, the Ephesians and the Galatians in the New Testament. The book of Acts, also in the New Testament, tells us about St Paul's life and works. He, too, is buried in Rome.
He is depicted holding a scroll, which symbolises his letters, and a sword which symbolises his martyrdom as he was beheaded for his faith in 67 AD , also under orders of Emperor Nero.

To celebrate the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul, this assembly shows how instrumental they were in sharing the good news of Jesus, and how their example can inspire us to live a life of faith. https://www.tentenresources.co.uk/primary-subscription/assemblies/assembly-2020-06-29/2020 0629 assembly for home/

Let us pray for the people of Europe and missionaries who deliver God's love there. We pray that Europe may be a place where the homeless find a home, the lonely find friends, and the sick find care. Amen.

Our fourth colour is BLUE which represents the waters around OCEANIA.

## Our Prayer for Oceania

Let us pray for the people of Oceania and missionaries who deliver God's love there. We pray that we may all value and care for the oceans and sea life and all whose work involves the sea. Amen.

Our fifth colour is YELLOW which represents the bright morning sun of Asia.

## Lectio Divina



One of my favourite Gospel stories is found in Matthew 8:5-10. It is the story of Jesus healing the Centurion's servant.
One of our most important responses during Mass comes from this reading - can you identify it? It is said during the holiest part of the Mass, the Eucharist.

Find a quiet space, put on some peaceful music, light a candle, make the sign of the cross and read this scripture from Matthew: which word(s) really stood out for you? Why do you think this is? What is God saying to you about your life?
