We hope you like the work that some of our children have been doing while in school. There are currently between one and four children in school, depending on need and parental rotas. It is a worrying time for the children and it can be a long day when they just want to be home and the school is empty and quiet, but we are making it as fun as we can.

Thank you: The Staff and I would all like to thank our critical worker families for all their kind words and messages. We especially thank you for accessing the opening system fairly and with such thoughtfulness for the safety, welfare and well-being of all. We know you are concerned, not just about the risks for your own children and other children in school and their families, but also to that of our Staff and their families too. We are happy to help as we know you are only using the school opening when you absolutely have to, and are keeping children safely home when and where you can. Thank you for this – it is much appreciated by us all and we thank you for your service in the response to virus.


Father Seán has also been uploading, under 'Featured Videos', a History of the Church Course, which Parents may wish to view and listen to.

We monitor our emails and will ring you — we are always happy to talk things through and help or signpost if there are worries or concerns. Home Learning

Our class email system appears to be working and, in the background, we are checking if we have not heard from families. It would be helpful to Staff if Parents could just email now and again to confirm that you have received the weekly home learning and that you are all ok. Many of you are already doing this and sending teachers lovely messages and photos of things you are doing at home. The Teachers are really enjoying these – we miss you all as much as you are missing us.

We have taken a decision, based on this and on our rotas and staff circumstances that we will not make regular phone calls to parents or children. We do not want to disturb the routines of your days — we believe that would be unhelpful. Also, pulling children away to talk to a teacher when they are happily involved in something, is not always wanted, nor helpful to the child either. However, we are conscious that as the weeks move on children may be more upset and will be having the odd difficult day. The children's well-being is a concern to us and so if you feel a 'check-in' chat would be useful, then please let the teacher know and we can try and arrange a suitable day and time.

Please do not worry if you cannot manage the learning, the class emails are in place – just let the teachers know if you are having difficulties. We don't want any family stressing over home learning. A little bit at a time is all that is needed. Just try and maintain reading, spelling and timetables practice sessions. You have the access to our learning platforms too – Education City, Purple Mash, Timetables Rockstars.

Pie Corbett Radio Blogging: RadioBlogging.Net is a daily radio programme that teaches literacy and is aimed at families and schools. It is interactive so that children write and the same of the same

Live and Pre-Recorded Lessons, Google/Microsoft Classrooms

We understand there have been a couple of parents querying on social media why our teachers are not engaging in these methods of educating while at home. It may appear from the press and social media that the all schools in the nation are now using these. Please be advised that this is not the case.

The recommendation by the Government, Surrey Local Authority and Unions are that schools continue to do what is <u>reasonably manageable</u> by teachers and TAs in what are difficult circumstances for all. In the background the staff are dealing with their own family's needs and balancing this with the St Francis school work they have to do. They all have husbands, wives and partners working from home, may be sharing technology and for those with primary and secondary age children, they are managing home learning for their children too. While doing this, teachers are also planning and organising our home learning as well as completing the other school work going on in the background such as training,

reviewing the curriculum plans, report writing etc. In addition, the staff are on rotas for school opening, which takes constant adjusting when take into account staff who are shielding themselves and family members, and some staff having to have time off due to being ill and self-isolating.

<u>Live Lessons</u>: On Thursday almost 200 Primary School Headteachers 'met' in an online meeting where we discussed many issues including home learning and what we were all doing. In terms of 'live' lessons 93% of those schools present were not doing 'live' lessons. The Government and teaching unions do not advise them due to concerns around safeguarding children and protecting staff. For this reason, we will not be engaging in producing 'live' lessons.

The vast majority of schools are using a mixture of emails, blogs, school websites, online platforms, just like us, and no one wants families to feel overwhelmed by home learning, especially with the wide range of families with differing access to technology.

<u>Google Classrooms and Microsoft Education</u>: We are already looking into Google Classrooms and Microsoft Education and pre-recorded lessons, but this will take time to set up and for staff to be trained on these platforms. It will not happen immediately.

Re-Opening of Schools

Headteachers are getting daily updates from the Government, Department for Education (DfE), but we too have to 'wait and see' and watch the TV for the latest news as you do! We do not get information in advance. Our Unions are very much working with the Government to ensure that we only open when it has been <u>planned</u> and <u>safe</u> for both children and staff. The newspaper and press reports around UK schools re-opening are speculative and very unhelpful for everyone's wellbeing. We will let you know as soon as we know!

Please be assured, the staff will pick up learning when we open again and manage the 'catch-up'. We are used to dealing with children of all abilities, children returning (having forgotten learning) after a long summer holiday, children starting the school mid-way through years, missing learning through hospital stays, starting school with English as an additional language etc. We will manage the transition back as and when – we are already planning some of the things we know that we will need to do. It will all be dependent on advice from the Government, the DfE and Surrey Local Authority Education Department.

Online Safety & Reporting Problems

In light of the new ways we are all finding to communicate and to access online learning it is timely to remind everyone of the following sites that may be supportive for reporting and learning about online safety. Please check that your Parental Controls are in place and that the sites the children are accessing are monitored closely. Also, continue to discuss online safety with the children regularly and keep reminding them to tell you if something worries them.

ALERT – ZOOM APP: Please be aware that if you are using Zoom there have been some very unfortunate incidents of 'hacking' reported on this site when security controls have not been set properly. Please check that the security settings are firmly in place if you or your children are using Zoom.
